The History of...

The pilot for this new project is expected to begin this summer. This project will be documenting the history of various subjects pertinent to the villages of Bartlett not fully explored in previous research.

The first subject to be explored will be skiing. - January 17th Annual Meeting -

A few dedicated members braved the near 0 degree weather to attend and to participate in the following business items:

- -They agreed to keep the office chalet open throughout this winter, and to evaluate the expenses incurred prior to setting the budget for 2008.
- -Honorary memberships were issued to the four original participants of the Life, Legends and Lore-Village Voices oral history program.
- -The policies and procedures for accepting and recording a complete, up-to-date membership list and the responsibilities for the members of the board were accepted as presented. The membership listing shall be maintained by the secretary and shall be available at the office at all times.
- -Dues collected at any time during the year will expire on December 31st and will be due and payable on January 1st of each year.
